 - 2.4.1 Directors and/or Members can consider disciplinary action. Ist any directors through a Special Directors Meeting. To suspend any members from service requires a 4/7 affirmative vote from the Board. To expel and terminate the service of a director will require an affirmative vote of 5/7 of the Board.
- 2.5 On Article VIII: ICM Missions Statement

 The missions statement was discussed and was resolved to read as: "International Care
 Ministries USA (ICM) considers it her mission to promote, assist and support the work
 of Care Ministries, such as International Care Ministries Philippines Inc. (ICMPI),
 whose scope of relief work in the slums of the Philippines is detailed in the attached
 Appendix A."
- 3. Sharon Tin gave a brief report on the planned Annual Assessment of ICMPI to be held from June 23-July 2, which will be attended by all staff of ICMPI with Sharon and Richard Tin.
- Sharon Tin informed the Board that the Care Center extension construction will be completed in June and the dedication of the new Extension would be held on June 28, 1999.
- 5. The Board gave Sharon the authority to appoint officers of the Board until the next AGM.
- 6. There being no other business, the meeting was closed with prayer by Dr. John Chan and adjourned at 12:30 PM.

ARTICLE I

Meetings

Section 1. Annual Meetings - The annual meetings of the members shall be used at the principal office of the corporation in November of each year. The fiscal year of ICM shall be from August 1 to July 31.

Section 2. Regular/Special Meetings - Regular meetings of the members shall be held quarterly by the President of the corporation. During such meetings, the President shall render his quarterly report to the members regarding the activities of the corporation.

Special meetings may be called as the need thereof arises, by the Board of Directors or the President of upon petition of 1/3 of the general membership.

Section 3. Notices - Notices of the date, time and place of annual, quarterly and special meetings of the members shall be given either personally or by special delivery mail, at least one week before the date set for such meeting. In urgent cases, the notice may be communicated at least two days before the meeting personally or by telephone, or by telegram, if contact is not possible. The notice of every special meeting shall state briefly the purpose or purposes of the meeting. No other business shall be considered at such meeting, except with the consent of all the members present thereat.

Section 4. Waiver of Notice - Notice of meeting may be waived verbally by any member attending it.

Section 5. Quorum - A majority of the members of the Board, i.e. 4/7 of the directors, must be present at any director's meeting to constitute a quorum. For the passage of any motion relating to the change in any part of the bylaws, rules and regulations of the corporation, an affirmative vote of 5/7 of the entire Board must be required.

ARTICLE 11

Directors

Section 1. Board of Directors - The corporate powers of the corporation shall be exercised, its business conducted and its property controlled by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Qualifications - No members shall be eligible for election to the Board of Directors unless he has the following qualifications:

- 1. He must be a "born-again", evangelical Christian of good standing in the community.
- 2. He must be a person of known repute, untainted character and unquestionable integrity.
- 3. He must remain qualified during his tenure of office.
- 4. He must be willing to be subjected to close scrutiny by the Board, in order to determine his qualifications.
- 5. He must be willing to abide by the by-laws and decisions of the board.
- 6. Such other qualifications that the board may consider.

ARTICLE III

Officers

Section 1. Officers - The officers of the corporation shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer and an Auditor. They shall be elected by the Board of Directors from among themselves. The Board may combine compatible offices in a single person.

Section 2. Term of Office of Officers - All officers of the corporation shall hold office for one year and until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

Section 3. Disqualification of Directors or Officers – Any director who has committed a criminal offense or become negligent in fulfilling his/her duties as a director may be removed from the directorship immediately after a majority vote of 5/7 of the directors after deliberation.

ARTICLE IV

Functions & Powers of Officers

Section 1. President - The President shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the corporation. In addition to duties as such, he shall preside in all meetings of the Board of Directors and those of the members of the corporation.

He shall execute all resolutions and/or decisions of the Board of Directors. He shall be charged with directing and overseeing the activities of the corporation. He shall appoint and have control over all employees of the corporation, review and approve expense vouchers. Together with the Secretary of the corporation, he shall present to the Board of Directors and the members an annual budget and, from time to time as may be necessary, supplemental budgets. He shall submit to the Board as soon as possible after the close of each fiscal year, and to the

members of each annual meeting, a complete report of the activities and operations of the corporation for the fiscal year under his term.

Section 2. Vice-President - The Vice President shall exercise all powers and perform all duties of the President during the absence or incapacity of the latter and shall perform duties that may be assigned by the board of directors.

Section 3. Secretary - The Secretary shall give all the notices required by these bylaws and keep the minutes of all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors and of all meetings of all committees, in a book kept for the purpose. He shall maintain the correspondence files, records and all financial records of the Treasurer. I hall maintain the members' register. He shall also perform all such other duties and work as the Board of Directors may from time to time assign to him.

Section 4. Treasurer - The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds, receipts and disbursements of the corporation. He shall keep all money and other valuables of the corporation in such bank or banks as the Board of Directors may designate. He shall keep and have charge of the books of accounts, which shall be open to inspection by any member of the Board of Directors, whenever required an account of financial condition of the corporation and of all transactions made by him as Treasurer. He shall also perform such other duties and functions as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Board of Directors. He shall post a bond in such amount as may be fixed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE V

Members

Section 1. Qualifications for Membership - Qualifications for member ship shall be the same as those for Directors (Article II, Section 2). All directors are members also, and are to voted into office by the members at the annual general meeting.

Section 2. Rights of Members - A member shall have the following rights:

- a. To exercise the rights to vote on all matters relating to the affairs of the corporation;
- b. To be eligible to any elective or appointive office of the corporation;
- c. To participate in the annual general meeting (AGM) of the corporation and any other meetings that are so determined by the Board as necessary.
- d. To avail of all the facilities of the corporation;
- e. To examine all the records or books of the corporation during designated business hours.

Section 3. Duties and Responsibilities of the Members - A member shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

- a. To obey and comply with the bylaws, rules and regulations that may be promulgated by the corporation from time to time,
- b. To attend all meetings called by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VI

Saspension, Expulsion and Termination of Membership

Suspension, expulsion and termination of membership shall be in accordance with the rules and regulations of the corporation.

Directors and/or members can consider disciplinary action against any directors through a special Board of Directors' meeting. To suspend any members from service requires a 4/7 affirmative vote from the Board. To expel and terminate the service of a director will require an affirmative vote of 5/7 of the Board.

ARTICLE VII

Funds

Section 1. Funds - The funds of the corporation shall be derived from donations and benefits.

Section 2. Disbursements - Withdrawal from the funds of the corporation, whether by check or any other instrument shall be signed by the Treasurer and countersigned by the President. If necessary, the Board of Directors may designate other signatories.

Article VIII

Mission Statement

International Care Ministries US/1 (ICM) considers it her mission to promote, assist and support the work of Care Ministries, such as that of International Care Ministries Philippines Inc. (ICMPI). The scope of the relief work of ICMPI in the slums of the Philippines is as stated in the attached Appendix A.

Appendix A

Current Goals and Services of ICMPI

- 1. Provision of help to the poor is done through the recommendation of the indigenous staff to the Philippine Board of Directors.
- 2. The recipients should fall under the category of:

a. Orphans

- b. Widows/widowers
- c. Jobless or earning a monthly salary under US\$50
- d. Tuberculosis victims
- e. Lepers
- f. Medical victims with conditions near death

3 Feeding:

- a. Distribution of feeding is done in feeding centers located in thirty-two districts in the island of Negros Occidental. Feeding recipients must register and collect their rations in person.
- b. The duration of the feeding program per recipient is one year. Those with severe medical cases and who fall under the category of absolute poverty can apply for an extension of their feeding.
- c. The feeding contract is not transferable should the recipient die during their oneyear program.

4. Medical:

- a. Medical care recipients must go to one of the thirty open-air clinics for treatment. Transportation cost is not provided.
- b. Each open-air clinic must work cooperatively with a slum Christian church.
- c. Each recipient must approach the slum pastor for recommendation for treatment at the clinic to avoid falsifying illness.
- d. A recipient must not be given more than one week's supply of medicine.
- e. If the recipient sells their medicine for money, they will be disqualified from further medical help.
- f. In group meetings, the active tuberculosis victims should be separated from the healthy.
- g. Each participating church must conduct a Parent Health Education class to their surrounding community.
- h. A livelihood will be given as an incentive to any woman/man in the slum who agrees to be sterilized. All cost will be absorbed by the ministry.
- Sterilization will be given to women/men with at least three children.
- j. IUDs will be provided free of charge to any group of thirty or more people.
- k. All medicines will be purchased and brought over from Hong Kong.
- All medical staff must have annual physical examinations.
- Livelihood:

The recipients should fall under the category of:

- a. Indigent pastors
- b. Widows/widowers
- c. Jobless or earning a monthly salary under US\$50
- d. Tuberculosis victims
- e. Lepers
- f. Sterilization recipients
- 6. All potential microloan recipients must attend Livelihood Training to qualify for help.
- 7. Recipients can only apply for livelihood from the ministry's project | gs as stated below:
 - a. Fishing boats
 - b. Rice farming
 - c. Water purification
 - d. Sewing
 - e. Crafts
 - f. Sugar cane farming
 - g. Fish farming
 - h. Trucking
 - i. Pig farming
 - j. Garlic farming
 - k. Onion farming
 - 1. Red pepper farming
- 8. Livelihood recipients should have a weekly accountability session with their microloan leader.
- International Care Ministries Philippines Inc. will provide help to purchase a plot for burial and provision of burial services/embalmment for the absolute poor recipients.
- 10. International Care Ministries Philippines Inc. will provide free weekly video/film showings to slum communities.
- 11. International Care Ministries Philippines Inc. will provide a mobile library five days per week in sixteen slums.
- 12. Donated goods can only be distributed through the Donated Goods Committee and should be given door-to-door.
- 13. Each month of May will be spent entirely for slum surveys.
- 14. Recommendation of new slum intake should be done at each June Annual Assessment.
- 15. Each July, International Care Ministries Philippines Inc.will conduct a formal changeover event of new and old feeding recipients.

Tith Fitapino woman standing hefore Sharph Tin in the Bacolod slim in June 1992 was only 23, but the pastor who brought her said Jasephine had tuberculosis and would die in just two months. She needed money for a wother and grave.

"I will do better than that." Shaton tid her. "I will tury you life."

Back hume in Harry V

Back home in Hong Kong, Sharon pressuaded members of her church to give money and issked doctor triends to donate medicine to bely slumdwellens in the Philippine city. Among the first to receive adequate footsing, and medicine were losephine, a single mother, and her six-vent-old son, hesephine tiwal for these more vents, and though Tit did kill her. Sharon's help took the desperation out of her lind years

Sharon registered her Hong Knag

based organization. International Lare Ministries of the Philippines as a charity in 1993. Ale brught and refurbished a declied building in Bacolist and now has 19 full-time staff to distribute food, mechanic and clothing. She has introduced programs to teach stum-dwellers to raise pigs and ducks and harvest ish. "In this way," she says, "they pain dignity and self-worth."





Reaching out to the poor

Where would you find hope if you lived here?

Everyday is a struggle
a grasping for hope just to survive in these shantytowns. Most of the people her c born into the poverty, di e, and ignorance that plagues their lives. The government does little to help them. Many are without birth records, which excludes them from even citizenship. Does anyone care if they live or die or escape from their hopelessness? Care Ministries was created to do something...in Jesus' name.



Negros Occidental Island is in the central Philippines. Bacobod is a port effy of 1,500,000 people. The unskilled here rely on sugar cane exports for employment at plantations and processing plants. The poorest people live as squatters in the 60 stum areas within 5 miles of the city where there is no provision for waste. 'Homes' are very small, typically less than 100 spare (set and are constructed with available materials; scrap wood, eardboard, with a thatched palm or un road




Low constal areas like Bacolod suffer from an average of 20 typhoons per year. Often these cause severe flooding, mixing run-off debris with the sewage surrounding the slums. After the storm passes, thousands are homeless, sick, and seavenging flotsam to rebuild their shannes. Government assistance to the needy, even after major natural disasters, is very minumal. Corruption is rampant: donated clothing sometimes ends up being sold for profit in local markets - completely by passing the truly needy.



Over the past lew years. Care Ministries growth has been assisted by a small group of Hong Kong believers. Individuals have helped with air travel, surface shipping costs, and the purchase of a building. Generous baggage allowances have been obtained from airlines. Two Hong Kong physicians have provided free medicines. Drug companies have given discounts on medicine. All funds donated to Care Ministries are use for the needlest of slum residents. All supplies are purchased in a diligent, prudent manner. No "gifts" are made to bring goods into the Philippines, nor carry favor with the local officials.



There are no paid staff nor 'organization' outside the Philippines. Duties for Care Ministries workers are assigned and reviewed in a weekly meeting of each department. The entire staff meets monthly to coordinate its efforts. Care Ministries' annual budget is established by an independent board of advisors. Funds are paid according to the budget, which is audited by a CPA. Financial records are then submitted to government authorities.

There are 21 tull-time Care Ministries' native workers, who live on the second floor of the Center and pay no rent, but receive a valary of US\$80 per mouth. Staff roles include evangelists, follow-up workers, paramedies, Inclinood teachers, social workers, bookkeeper, and accountant. After typhoons, Care Ministries often provides materials to rebuild dwellings for the homeless. Our dedicated workers seek to build bonds first by serving physical needs. They risk contracting TB and other diseases by entering the slums, but each feels called and committed to serve the poor and spiritually needs.




Children's classes are held in the slums to teach Bible stories and correct moral choices. When donations of shoes or toys arrive, it is a time of special joy and celebration.



evangelism

With each contact, whether on home visus or at clinic treatments, our staff telt the poor about the New Testament way of salvation. Your gill of foxel medicine or hope is given in Jesus' name, so that recipients see their blessings as gifts from God through believers far away. Care Ministrice is a paractureh organization, not a church. We assist indigent churches in poor areas by conducting short-term prigrams to strengthen and equip their members. We also hold a regular schedule of evangelistic meetings for non-christians to call them to faith and obedience to Jesus.




"Touchpoint" is open every Tuesday evening at the Care Center for anyone to drop by for a time of encouragement, prayer, and enjoy an informal fellowship all focused on carring for the spiritual needs of people from the slums.



medical care

Shun dwellers are especially vulnerable to terrible diseases. Caused by malnutation, and people hypically centure. The temperature year round is 75.9515 with a tropical humality that makes the poor vulnerable to skin problems. Polluted water promotes gastoeines, oal diseases. These squalid conditions contribute to TB and hepitatis.



Our mobile chine visits slum areas and dispenses free medicine and simple exams to anyone without other health care alternatives. After medical consultation, patients and their families are given the opportunity to meet with local pastors who accompany the chine, for spiritual counseling. Potential recipients of food and medicine are qualified by a door-to-door canvas conducted by a native missionary Residents are also scienced and referred by the medical or feeding staff of Care Ministines. Food and packages are given for up to one year, based on landly size and circumstances.




fraumig programs

Care Ministries sponsors ongoing health education classes held every week near the shanty towns around the city. Poor people are taught the basic concepts of sanitation and health care for children. The Livelihoxid program is a skills training program to help unemployed slum residents become self-supporting. People learn to sew, bake and become street vendors in local markets-selling everything from bunanas to plastic bags. A limited nucro loan service is also provided to help beginners.

follow-up program

The Follow-Up Program trains individuals to take care of the new converts. Care Ministries holds seniinars to train pastors to be Follow-Up Instructors, who in turn train their exin church members to be counselors. These dédicated believers are their prepared to become spiritual parents to new converts. By God's Grace we have discovered an answer to the needs of Filipino Churches. For many years much emphasis has been put into evangelism and Follow-up work had been sadly neglected. We also help them by supplying free Bibles to the who have successfully completed the course.

The Care Center, our own 3500 sq. ft. two-storey building, is headquarters for our services. The lower floor has offices, a food distribution and storage area, a library for slum residents, and meeting rooms for discipleship training or health education seminars. The Center is also a place where the poor can receive simple emergency medical treatment 24 hours a day.

Follow-up Pig Incentive Program 10 pigs for Mountain Pastors in Concepcion, Iloilo

The past year we gave 31 pigs to various indigent pastors. This is an incentive to strengthen the Follow-Up Program, most of these pastors have no means of finding support. Their congregation tithes are hardly enough to meet their needs. Care provides breeding pigs to the pastors on the condition that they maintain a Follow-Up ministry with 5 active counselors per church. This program helps promote teamwork and eliminates a "one-man band" concept.

This December we have given 10 more pigs to the mountain pastors in Concepcion. Iloilo, making a total of 41 pigs. This means that 41 churches are helped through this program.

Fishing Boats in Aguisan Fishing Village.

For 5 years we have ministered to the Fishing Village in Aguisan. I've shown photos of numerous malnourished feeding recipients from this depressed area. Every morning the poor fishermen rent boats to go out fishing. Whatever their catch, 50% goes to the loan sharks.

Under our new Ownership Program, Care Ministries will rent boats to the fishermen. Each day, two fishermen partners will take home 60% of the catch. Care Ministries takes 40%.

When the savings amount to the cost of a boat; the boat will be entirely owned by them. By God's Grace, this will be a long-term project to raise these fishermen out of poverty.

A Special Fishing Boat in Roxas, Iloilo

This December on the small island of Roxas, I stayed with Pastor Nestor in their bamboo house on stilts. I had preached in his Fishing Village Church the night before. His village looks across at two islands that have no churches. We talked to Pastor Nestor of the possibility of planting churches in these islands. He was almost in tears that God was giving him his heart's desire.

Nestor has a tiny boat with only enough for a single seat. He scavenges the shores at low tide for scraps to feed his family and keep his work as a pastor. Since everyone is poor; the tithes cannot maintain his family. He had always wanted a motor boat strong enough to face the rough waves to bring him to those small islands where he could pioneer a church.

Such a boat will be finished by January and he plans to start pioneering two new churches in February 99. Please pray for Nestor.

Celebrate Jesus 1998

Five Chinese from Hong Kong brought 2500 sausages to Bacolod for our yearly Christmas gathering of the poor.

Over 2700 attended, with happy smiles everywhere. This is what heaven will be like. No more sorrows and suffering. It is our privilege to give them hope in their hopelessness. Celebrating Christmas is a big event for these indigent people.

They save 12 months of the year to buy outfits for this Christmas Choral Competition. It is hard to realize that these happy people live on a day to day basis. A lot of them have tuberculosis and their hope is as simple as tomorrow's meal. Seeing them enjoying themselves by celebrating the birth of Jesus is what brings fulfillment this brings to our ministry.

Each of these 2700 poor had a gift to take home. Many received the Lord through our evangelistic message that evening. We thank God for goods sent to us from Hong Kong that chabled us to extend this love to them. The Lord is good and worthy to be praised.

Freedom in Christ Seminar

I taught Follow-Up Level II. Freedom in Christ to pastors from 5° indigent churches. Since we have taught more than 700 churches in the Basics of Chris Living (Level I); I have selected these 58 churches on the basis of their faithfulness in the Follow-Up program. We have plans to use them as "Model Follow-Up Churches" to train other indigent Churches. Many times Christians go through life still carrying the garbage of their unsaved lives. This bondage stops them from growing deeper and fuller in their Christian Walk. Freedom In Christ is a practical guide in helping Christians see areas in their lives that need renunciation; and to help them understand how they have been deceived by the tactics of Satan.

At the end of the 2-day seminar, the Holy Spirit convicted the whole congregation; many pastors fell to their knees as God touched them. I believe God will bring to completion the work He started in these pastors. We are hoping to see 58 churches spiritually on fire when these men return home.

Care Extension Project

Because our ministry has grown substantially, we were unable to accommodate the medical recipients and the large crowd at our Touchpoint Fellowship meetings. Last November we purchased the lot next to our property.

We are praying for funds to come in to cover the cost of renovation. This will include a larger medical area, clinic, library, feeding distribution hall, meeting hall, dormitories and toilets. The renovation amounts to HK\$220,000 (U.S.\$28,390) The Lord has always provided and we trust He will provide for this urgent need.
